## Submission by National Park Village residents, ratepayers and friends of the village.

Our community group of residents, ratepayers and friends of National Park Village oppose and utterly reject the proposal to change the existing recognised name of National Park to Waimarino. We also oppose changing the name of the National Park Railway Station to Waimarino Railway Station.

The name changes, as proposed, are based on the proposers' information that there was a pa site where National Park Village is situated. From our investigations, this is now known not to be true.

Waimarino was never an official or unofficial recorded name for a township or place of occupation. It was just the Waimarino Station that had any status. Casual usage appears to be the reason people think that Waimarino was an official name.

The name National Park came about for a practical reason as people were travelling to the (Tongariro) National Park, which is still the case today, except on a much larger scale. And so the very existence of National Park Village is because of domestic and international visitors. Without these travellers and the concerted efforts by the people of NPV, the village would not have developed and there would be little other reason for the village to have remained in existence. We have a proud history of endeavour and achievement.

Our group of residents and ratepayers have worked and lived much of their lives in and around National Park Village. As well as their hard work they have contributed to the well-being of the community by supporting local organisations, the National Park School and the underlying economic base of the local businesses.

We specifically refer to:

### 1. Location - Waimarino Pa

The proposers indicated the pa was sited where National Park village is located. This is not true according to various sources.

- The proposers provided no evidence to support their claim of a pa site and kainga at National Park Village. Also, there are no known burial sites.
- Locals have no current or historical knowledge of a pa site in National Park Village
- Historical accounts of travels to the region place the pa site adjacent to the Waimarino Stream. [see Appendix 1]
- Public Works department line surveys for the NIMT in 1900 show signs of a pa
   and burial sites at 101 miles from Marton. [see Appendix
- Department of Lands. Their report records the site of the previous occupation of Waimarino Pa at 101 miles from Marton and the site of Waimarino Railway Station at 104 miles from Marton. [see Appendix 3]
- Cussons Trig was the only place marked on the early maps where NPV is today before the completion of NIMT and the establishment of the Waimarino Station.
   [see Appendix 3]
- Archaeological surveys identify five burial sites in the vicinity of Waikune.

• NZGB secretariat report notes the pa sometimes known as Waimarino Pa is correctly the Ngatokoerua Pa of Peehi Turoa at Waikune.

### 2. Identity of National Park Village

- **Geographical location**. National Park Village is at the highest point of SH4 at 825m and at the plateau between two watersheds. The Otemaewa Stream flows to the south joining the Makomiko Stream and then the Waimarino Stream at 720m at Erua. The Makaretu Stream flows to the north to join the Piopiotea Stream at Raurimu at 580m and later on joins the Whakapapa River. NPV has unique panoramic views of the four volcanoes in the Tongariro National Park. The village location is distinctly distanced from the Waimarino Stream.
- The loss of the **destination's identity** being National Park Village and the importance of its identity and strong branding position in the **international visitor Industry** would be detrimental to its sustainable future.
- The loss to locals is a loss of part of their **personal identity** and heritage. This affects the young through to the long-lived residents in the village.
- Our allegiances have naturally been to the north starting as part of the Auckland Province to today's arrangements with the Waikato Hospital Board area, telephone prefix of 07 (not 06) and in the northern electoral area of Ruapehu District Council.
- The area known as Waimarino is not a particular place of occupation.
- Waimarino has always been of a larger area based around the southern part of the Ruapehu District encompassing and based in and around Raetihi and Ohakune.
- Historically the Waimarino Block was created as a survey block which then became a parliamentary electorate, then to Waimarino County and now part of the Waimarino-Waiouru Community Board area.
- Identity encompasses the memories, experiences, relationships, and values that create one's sense of self. This construction creates a steady sense of who one is over time.

The name National Park (Village) has been well-established and recognised for 97 years. National Park Village has built up its identity through its businesses and local organisations, National Park Village Business Association Inc. and National Park Village Progressive Association Inc. The Business Association promotes the village as a visitor destination through its marketing and marketing alliances. 95% of our businesses are dependent on the visitor industry. The Progressive Association has its aims to improve and enhance social capital such as the NPV Community Hall, developing the Tupapakurua Falls Track, The National Park Village Plan, and advocacy to the Ruapehu District Council Annual and Long-Term Plans. Residents take pride in that identity, and many abhor the possibility of losing their lifelong identity by changing the village name.

No identification of a Waimarino village in the claim. No request to change the name of National Park Village although seven other locations were requested for a name change.

### 3. The Brand - National Park Village

The National Park Village brand was adopted by the Business Association in 1995 to do away with the confusion of the National Park name. This provides a clear and separate identity that has been strongly marketed around the world which says what it is and where it is better than any alternative. That, combined with our iconic attractions has been very successful in transforming the village from what was regarded as just a mill town to an international destination of choice.

- Websites. NPVBA-associated websites <u>www.nationalpark.co.nz</u> and <u>www.tongarirocrossing.org.nz</u> received 543,623 visits last year.
- Industry recognition. NPVBA is regarded as an industry leader and a significant contributor to our RTO Visit Ruapehu.
- Village Entry signs. Three substantial highway entry signs were financed (a \$50k project) and built by the NPVBA with the blessing of Ruapehu District Council, DOC and NZTA to provide a sense of identity and arrival. [See Appendix 8 for photos]

### 4. Confusion

- Changing the name may increase confusion amongst other Waimarino names and locations. [See Appendices 5, 6,7]
- We do not support any dual name which will create further confusion.
- Historical References. Many historical accounts by travellers in Papers Past refer
  to; as going to or from the Waimarino, or being in the Waimarino or travelling
  through the Waimarino. The only reference to a place that was sometimes
  known as the Waimarino Pa is at Waikune.
- Waimarino Purchase Report WAI 903 is another example of Waimarino referred to as an area.

#### Page 596 10.1

Waikune Prison was also established nearby the Waimarino 4 reserve at a time the reserve was under considerable pressure for alienation, including a number of public works takings, highlighting issues over the pressures placed on remaining Maori land **in Waimarino**, including for public purposes.

### Page 603 10.5

The first of the public works takings from Waimarino 4 appears to be the Main Trunk railway and road (later State Highway 4). These already ran **through Waimarino** by 1921 when the prison was proclaimed. As noted in earlier chapters, this area of the Waimarino plains between Ohakune and National Park, was part of an ancient travel route to the west of the volcanic peaks between the Manganui a te Ao area and Rotoaira and then Taupo

 The name National Park Village has been a success in reducing confusion for travellers and couriers, as has the unique postcode by New Zealand Post of 3948 centred on the Postal Agency at the National Park Service Station.

### 5. Letters of Support for the name change to Waimarino

- The letters of support received by the NZGB appear to be reliant on the
  information presented by the proposers without wider consultation. At no
  time was any consideration given to the views or impact on the National
  Park Village community. We are duly upset that those most affected were
  ignored in this respect.
- The support by Ruapehu District Council and Owhango National Park
  Community Board was limited to supporting in principle the application
  for a name change being made to NZGB. It was made clear it was not for a
  name change.

### 6. NZ Geographic Board

### New Zealand Geographic Board – Consultation document, secretariat research and supporting document.

06a. Page 4 and 04. Page 1

Early maps and survey plans name Waimarino for the plains, the stream, and the land block. Some plans name a Waimarino village and pā approximately 3.8km south of the current National Park at Waikune. The pā name is correctly Ngātokoerua and it's unclear if 'Waimarino' is colloquial, ie 'the village at Waimarino Plains'.

03. Page 5

When the NIMT railway line went through the original site c.1906 it's unclear if the village still existed. The Waitangi Tribunal Waimarino report does not note anything such as forced evictions among the many issues with the taking of the land. It's not clear what the timeline and events were between 'Waimarino Village' still being depicted on plans in 1897 to the south to when the new 'Township of Waimarino' was surveyed 4km north in 1910.

### 7. Our Proposal

### We propose that National Park be gazetted as National Park Village

- NPV is widely known. Meaningful. Descriptive. Unique.
- Google search produces dozens of results for National Park Village due to years of promotion by the businesses of National Park Village.
- NPV website traffic confirms international recognition of the name.
- The National Park name has been used successfully for 97 years.
- The word village avoids previous confusion with other national parks.

### Propose that National Park Village boundary be defined as the actual residential area.

- The National Park Village boundary needs a clear definition.
- The LINZ map of NZ Suburbs and localities currently shows that National Park includes much rural land and extends as far as 4km to Waikune. This is inaccurate and unsatisfactory.

#### CHAPTER XXIV. - NGATOKORUA PA

When we arrived at the pa, early in the day, we were received by Pehi and his people with a true Maori welcome.

One of the most remarkable features in connection with this place was that everything about it had a neat and tidy appearance, unlike all other settlements we had seen. It was situated at the foot of Mount Haurungatahi, whose steep sides, clothed with dense forests, towered up behind it. This mountain, we learned, was personified by the Maoris as the wife of Ruapehu. The view in every direction from the settlement was most enchanting, forest, plain, and mountain all combining to add variety to the surroundings.

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A number of early European visitors travelled into the Waimarino district following this traditional travel route along the Manganui a te Ao to reach Taupo and sometimes beyond. For example, E J Wakefield travelled up the Whanganui River and then the Manganui a te Ao on his way to Taupo, in 1841. Wakefield made the trip with the assistance of a Ngati Patutokotoko chief and a guide from Taupo, taking eleven days to reach Taupo from the junction of the Manganui a te Ao and the Whanganui rivers. Having left this junction, his party followed the Manganui a te Ao valley, crossing that river several times before moving northeast towards the Waimarino plains. Leaving the forest at the head of the Manganui a te Ao valley, they came out to a level plain (Waimarino) and grassy tussock lands from where Wakefield could see the snow-capped volcanic peaks. They then travelled in a northerly direction (following a similar route to what would later become part of state highway 4) skirting to the west of Mount Hauhungatahi and the volcanic peaks. On the way, Wakefield's party followed advice on utilising the natural resources of the area, adding to their provisions by digging fern root and shooting birds. Continuing along the west of the volcanic peaks, the Wakefield party then turned northeast, crossing the Whakapapa River and heading towards Lake Rotoaira




It also seems likely that a number of settlements were located inland from the major rivers, in selected locations on the interior lands. These may have been located near prized resources such as hot pools, or at strategically important communications points linking more open areas with river-based settlements through dense forest. For example, Pakeha visitors, surveyors and land purchase officers, also noted the important village of Ngatokorua, near the foot of Mount Hauhungatahi and close to the Waimarino stream, which by the 1880s, was the village of the chief Peehi Turoa. In other cases, interior areas were visited and managed seasonally for the resources they provided.

These two sections below are Waikune 101 miles from Martin, and Waimarino Station 104 miles from Marton.







About two miles from the viaduct the line emerges from the bush and enters the historic Waimarino Plains. These undulating, grassy slopes, covering an area of about eight miles in length and from one to four in width, form a remarkable feature in the midst of the vast forests surrounding them (see photo.). The line skirts the edge of the forest on the east side for some three or four miles, and then crossing the plains, runs close to and parallel with the western forest line until it once again enters it. This large expanse of open land, covered with native grass and tussock was the scene of many a raid in old times by the Waikato Māori's on their way to invade Taranaki, and the remains of the earthworks of the old Waimarino Pa, two miles beyond Erua Station (99 miles), on the edge of the bush, still remain to attest former occupation by the Natives While crossing the plains, above the bushy slopes surrounding them, the craters of Tongariro, the ever-active volcano of Ngauruhoe, and the colossal mountain of Ruapehu, distant some ten to twelve miles, are constantly in view (see photo.). In close proximity to the Waimarino Pa are some small but fine patches of native bush well worthy of preservation, and all the land between the line and the Ruapehu Mountains is very suitable for" an extension of the National Park, as a dense forest spreads over the slopes to near Hauhangatahi (4,983 ft. in height)—a volcanic cone now extinct. The Waimarino Railway station, 104 miles from Marton, is situated a mile south of the northern end of the plains, and here the last glimpses are seen of the mountains and the southern Waimarino Forest.


- The Department of Lands report map below shows the Waimarino–Taumarunui Road traversing through the district.

- Cusson's Trig is named where National Park Village is located. No mention of a village or pa.





"We expect this role will be advertised in early November."


